(St. Angela Merici) foundress of the Ursulines.

Today, the feast of St. Ursula (October 21st), we draw our Jubilee celebrations to a close - but history again invites us to remember - and to look ahead in thanksgiving to the celebration of our Centenary. We recall the psalmist's words:

"The Lord is good. He is always loving and kind. His faithfulness goes on and on to each succeeding generation".

(Ps. 100:5)

The history of the Ursulines in Australia witnesses to the goodness and faithfulness of the Lord in each generation; witnesses to the religious, parents and students - our Ursuline Associates, who over the last 100 years, have known and responded to the love of the Lord.

The first Ursulines to come to Australia were members of the Ursuline Community in Duderstadt. Germany. This community had been serving their Lord for over 200 years when, in 1877, as a result of Bismark's May Laws, they were forced to leave Germany and their homeland and take refuge in Greenwich, England. Here they were helped by a Capuchin priest, Elzear Torregiani.

Four years later, and 100 years ago, Elzear Torregiani was appointed Bishop of the new diocese of Armidale (N.S.W.) In December of that year. 1881, this new Bishop invited these German Ursulines to come to Australia and to his diocese - to "a home Bismarck will never take from you."



On New Year's Day, 1882, the Superior asked each member of the community to give her secret answer to the Bishop's request. Ten professed nuns, including the Superior, Sister Bernard Wippern, chose to be "missionaries to Australia."

They left London on 24th May and arrived in Armidale on 12th September, 1882 - after a journey that is a story in itself. They must have been very conscious of St. Angela's promise:

> 'If it was He who planted it in the first place, who is there that can uproot it?'

Bismarck had taken away their material possessions, but could not uproot their love for and faith in their Lord, and His call.

Persecution and hardship, and now a new land with a new language and culture, did not weaken their response to His love and belief in His faithfulness. Quickly they adapted to their new land and with the psalmist would say:

"Our children (of Australia) too shall serve Him, for they shall hear from us of the wonders of the

generations yet unborn shall hear of miracles He did for us!'

(Ps. 22:30.31)

They told of the wonders of the Lord in Armidaleand, within fifty years, in Ashbury, Dutton Park, Tweed Heads, Oxley and Toowoomba (1930-31). Heeding St. Angela's words, they had learnt from their Lord how to live in response to His love.

DURING THIS CENTENARY YEAR, LET US TOO RECALL HIS GOODNESS AND FAITHFULNESS:

"LET US LEARN FROM HIM WHAT WE MUST DO FOR HIS LOVE" AS WE PASS ON TO THE NEXT GENER-ATION THE WONDERS OF THE LORD THE MIRACLES HE HAS DONE FOR US.

This is a challenge to us in today's society. Let us take courage from the message of John Paul II:

"To be a witness to Christ, to bear witness to Him, it is necessary, first, to follow Him. It is necessary to learn to know Him, to place oneself, so to speak, in His school, to penetrate all His mystery.


Let us learn from Him!





DUKE OF EDINBURGH

Following the presentation of our first Bronze Awards last year, we were overwhelmed by enthusiastic candidates during 1981.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award is a learning and growing experience and requires of the candidate initiative, enthusiasm and most of all committment to whatever is required of her.

Of our large starting group some have fallen by the wayside but we still have approximately 20 girls who are perservering.

Each girl has completed three sections of the Award: -

Service - 15 hours over 3 months Social Skills - 5 - 6 lectures Interest - over 6 months

In the Service section we had girls visiting many nursing homes, hospitals and children's homes, including Brodribb, Wesley, Hamewith, St. Andrews Hospital, St. Vincents Hospital, Lourdes Home and Rangehaven.

The Social skills section was conducted by Mrs. Lyle Cadzow who instructed the girls in the art of grooming, hair care, skin care, make up etc. Our thanks must go to Mrs. Cadzow for showing her interest in us and for giving of her time to conduct these sessions.

In the interests section, the girls chose either an existing hobby or an entirely new hobby and developed certain skills in that area over a period of 6 months. Interests included dressmaking, video, ballet, pottery, swimming, music, glassblowing and cooking.

The 4th and most difficult section is the expedition work. Where after much preliminary training, a 2 day hike is planned and undertaken. On the 10/11 October a training camp was held at Perseverance Dam - 15 of our girls and 4 Concordia girls attended.

On the Saturday the girls had lectures in first aid, map and compass reading, country code and demonstrations in camp cooking and packing for a hike. Later in the evening a film on the scheme was shown and the Sunday hike was planned using skills acquired during the day. 


BASKETBALL



BALL GAMES


"Tunnel straight," "push, push," and "watch your feet" were echoed many times in the first two frantic weeks of term 4, as our ball games competitors practised their skills.
