The academic year commenced with 419 students in Years 8-10 with 302 day students and 117 boarders and 115 boarding students in Years 11 and 12. Occupancy of all places in both the College and Boarding area is at a maximum. It is imperative that more financial help be forthcoming for boarding schools catering for country students, if we are to continue this important apostolate. We urge parents to be politically active in this field.

The College received a Participation and Equity Program grant in 1984 which was used for the better transition of Year 7 primary students to Year 8 secondary. The Year 8 curriculum was revitalized, and hopefully the young Year 8 students have found secondary school to be a 'good place' to stay in. We have also received this year a Multi-Cultural grant of \$2,000 which will better enable us to introduce Multi Cultural Studies to the College. Besides Multi Cultural Studies as a new subject, Graphics will be introduced to Year 10 in 1986 and Year 8 in the second semester of 1986.

Our P & F Association has been very active again this year under the leadership of Mr. John McClure, President and Mrs. D. Franzmann. Secretary, Mr. T. Allport chaired the Fete Committee and the Fete itself was a credit to his quiet and calm leadership. To all who are on the P & F Committee and to all who have given so much of your time and money in working for St. Ursula's we are very grateful. A surprise gift to us this year as a fund raiser was a pure bred Arabian Gelding - Kobble Lodge Mezair donated by Mrs. Sue Kelly of Kobble Lodge Stud. Mezair was indeed a beautiful horse and won our hearts but to one only goes the prize and the Ferguson family of Leigh Creek were the lucky winners.

Several of our staff will be leaving next year — Miss Angela Young back to N.S.W.; Miss Marian McNaught to Beenleigh; Mr. Graeme Cordner to Murwillumbah; Mr. Andrew Burger to Concordia College and Mrs. Anne Marie White to Brisbane. Mrs. Vicki Roberts is taking twelve months leave to go to Indonesia. Next year we welcome back Mrs. Jenness Perrin and Mrs. Cathy Aitchison who rejoin our staff after the birth of their babies. Mrs. Mary Langler will be returning from the U.S.A. to resume duties in 2nd term; Miss Debbie Haupt will be returning



from France to resume duties in Semester 2. Sr Denise Daly O.S.U. will be joining the Community in 1986. Denise will be teaching at Downslands and will be active in the Boarding School. Sr. Leon Pallissier O.S.U. will also join the Community on her return from Rome early in 1986 and will be active in the Boarding School and teaching at St. Ursula's.




Each Christian Living Day has a theme, whether it be PRAYER, RELATIONSHIPS WITH


As a result of all the effort, the musical this year was a great success and an enjoyable experience for all concerned.

OVERSEAS TRIP

Nineteen eighty-six is going to be a truly unique period in my life. It will be a year for experiencing a different style of life devoid of many of the conveniences and luxuries we so often take for granted; a year for experiencing and appreciating more fully, the very rich cultures of our Asian neighbours; a year for giving and receiving; a year for developing long-lasting friendships; and of course, a year for coping, or not coping, with the inherent problems associated with living and travelling in areas quite dissimilar from our own "secure little corner of the world".

Next year, my family and I are taking up residence in the Asian part of the world. Our intentions are to aid, in some way, people who are not as privileged as we are. Initially, we planned to work at the "grass-roots" level, but because of the communication difficulty, this is not possible.

For the majority of the year, we are giving assistance, wherever possible, to the Ursuline Students' Hostel in Bandung, Indonesia, and to the Salvation Army Boys' Home, Penang, Malaysia. The last three months of our overseas sojourn will be spent travelling through countries such as, Burma, India, Nepal, Bhutan, Pakistan and Thailand.

In September, I joined the Downlands Staff Development Tour for a four-week trip to Israel, Greece, Turkey and Italy. Israel and Turkey became very special places to me. Israel is a land of contrasts. It is a barren land (far different from Jesus' time), but the Israelis produce magnificent fruit and vegetables that seem to grow out of rock. The people are tolerant of each other and Arab and Jew live for the most part with understanding or at least acceptance.

My very special places were Nazareth where I found the Basilica of the Annunciation to be a very prayerful and beautiful church. There is a mosiac depicting Mary in an Australian setting.

Contributions to the basilica were asked for and received from all over the world and it was good to touch into the symbols of home. To attend Mass at the cave where Christianity began was very meaningful to me. Another place of great significance was the Garden of Gethsemane. The olive trees with their gnarled misshapen trunks seem to mirror the agony Jesus experienced there and seemed to be a very appropriate tree for such a place.



We hear so much of the ancient treasures of Greece, however, Turkey has many magnificent ruins. Ephesus, once a major seaport, is well preserved and is being beautifully restored by the Austrians. As we walked down the stone roads between houses, inns, baths and saw the Library of Celsus, I could believe that a chariot would turn the corner at any time. In the hills a half hour drive from Ephesus is the House of Mary. It was here that St. John took Mary and where she died. Neither St. Paul nor St. John would allow her to stay in Ephesus as it didn't have a very good reputation.

It was good to come home so I could begin planning a return trip to see and learn more.

BOTSWANA

When I was 14 I sent away for a brochure on tours of Africa — my dream was to one day go there - I still have the brochure and on November 24, 1984 I realised that dream when I set off for 3 months to the Ursuline Mission in Botswana, Botswana — a tiny dry poor land of 1 million people - bordered by South Africa, Zimbabwe and Namibia - a land of 85% desert a dry dry land where the blessing of Tsayama ka Pula means 'go well with the rain', a peaceful land, a land of contrast — where you can wander along the parched and sandy riverbed at sunset and watch the swana women, buckets balanced delicately on their head, making their way to collect water from deep below the sand and then head to Theo's fried chicken take away to buy a can of coke; where crops fail because there's no rain and the cattle die out on the cattle posts but there's still a few pula (currency) for the chibuku (local been); a land where sunsets fill the sky with reds and pinks and swirls, but when you're hungry sunsets don't mean very much: a land where donkeys and goats abound: where last year thousands of people turned out to watch the first traffic lights in action in Gaberone, the capital: a land where there has only been a need for an army in the last 3 years; a land where 'if you can do it next week instead of today then that's OK !': a land where the traditional village life is coming face to face with the materialism of the West; a land of poverty vet hope.

I lived with the Ursuline sisters in Mahalapye, a railway town on the link between South Africa and Zimbabwe — there are two Ursuline houses







in Botswana - Mahalapve and Serowe (being the village of the great Khama tribe - Sir Seretese Khama being the first President). It was rather an international community but with Sr. Leone visiting from Australia as well, the Aussies outnumbered the others. I worked with the handicapped people in the village - Idah. Michael, Kapura, Sam and David, It was fairly frustrating work in that there were very few resources available, there was no market for anything made, it was difficult to look to any long term project. However, we did manage to do some leatherwork and seed curtain making and despite our language barrier, we were able to become a little community. The highlight of our day was the morning tea of fresh buns from the old lady who sat on the footpath selling her goodies.


As well as working with the handicapped, I often went with Sr. Emmanuel into the village on visits to the sick and the poor and I was quite privileged in being able to experience the village life in such a way. I learnt to live the prayer given to me by the school community here before I left —

Do not be afraid to see
What is really there
Do not be afraid of the next day,
the next hour,
the next moment.
There He is.
Do not be afraid of Him
Do not be afraid of His language, or
the looks of Him or the smell of Him
He is your God.

I will remember the visits to old Samuel dving on his dirty bed in a dark rondavel, all alone: to Mary who slept in a shanty of branches. who smelt and drank and was totally destitute vet who had a tremendous spirit of survival: to Marsupa blind, hunched and rocking from side to side in her bed, crying at the pain of her arthritis, yet showing a great acceptance and humility. There are so many special people -Magogodi — the young swana novice who abounded with life and energy and who was constantly in wonder at my stories of Australia: Martha and Olcan — Irish Cross and Passion sisters who looked after me with great hospitality for a week; the bush women in Serowe who laughed and joked and allowed me to spend a day with them teaching them macrame and sharing a 'bush' meal with them; the children who delighted in calling out 'good morning teacher as you passed - no matter the time of the day !: The old lady who, often with great grandchild strapped to her back would faithfully walk to Mass each day—and so the list goes on.

There are so many stories and so many deeply etched experiences to share — the Christmas liturgies; the trip to Victoria Falls and Chobe Park (elephants and giraffes abounding); time spent in South Africa — in Krugersdorp and Lebowa; my birthday spent in a small village Shoshong living the presence of God in the simplicity of his African people; the day trip to the cattle post of Mogola; the baboons in the garden at Moreneng; the barbeque to celebrate birthdays at 'the Rocks' on the outskirts of town; the excitement at seeing water in the river, watching the sun set over the Zambesi River — the experiences endless, words inadequate. Mý dream now is to return!








Sandy and Sr. Mary have always been on hand with washing tokens, coat hangers, charge lists and Panadol — trying to help everyone in Garda with their hassles.







At the Toowoomba district, we were again


