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


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
ELIZABETH DAVIDSON COURSE

A Gamelan is an Indonesian Orchestra which consists of various metallaphones of different pitch, drums, gongs, and reong (tuned bronze kettles). The charm and initial difficulty is in the mastery of the interlocking rhythms of this percussion orchestra, a skill to which the students applied themselves under the direction of Wayan Gandra. Wayan is one of Bali's leading composers and musicians who lectures at the Denpasar Conservatorium and leads the Peliatan Gong. His visit to Australia was funded by the Australian Music Board through a submission prepared by the Darling Downs Balinese Gamelan.

The students attended rehearsals once a week at Harristown High School and developed greatly in the seven weeks. The Youth Orchestra performed at the Toowoomba Carnival of Flowers, a fund raising Garden party and in the Fiesta Concert.

This opportunity was enjoyed by the girls both as a musical extension and an insight into Balinese culture.



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PORCELAIN DOLL MAKING

One of the major assignments completed by the year 10 Home Economics classes, was the making of a porcelain doll. The whole process took several weeks to complete.

There are various steps involved in making the dolls. First is the pouring of porcelain into the moulds to form the heads and hands which are then left until set. In the meantime students begin to make and stuff the body. Once the porcelain is set, the rough edges are smoothed, then tinting of the porcelain to skin tone and painting of life like features on the face and hands are completed. The most difficult and frustrating task is to place the brown or blue eyes securely in the head. When finished, the head and hands are attached to the body.

Even then, the doll is only half finished, for it has to be dressed in a beautiful lace trimmed christening robe. The making of this robe is extremely time consuming, for it is embroidered by hand. The dress is matched with knitted or crocheted booties and a bonnet.

As you can see, the making of porcelain dolls is not an easy task but a very worthwhile and rewarding experience.

And so, on this happy note, a term of ballroom dancing lessons was brought to a successful end. Good luck to all those who intend to participate next year.




