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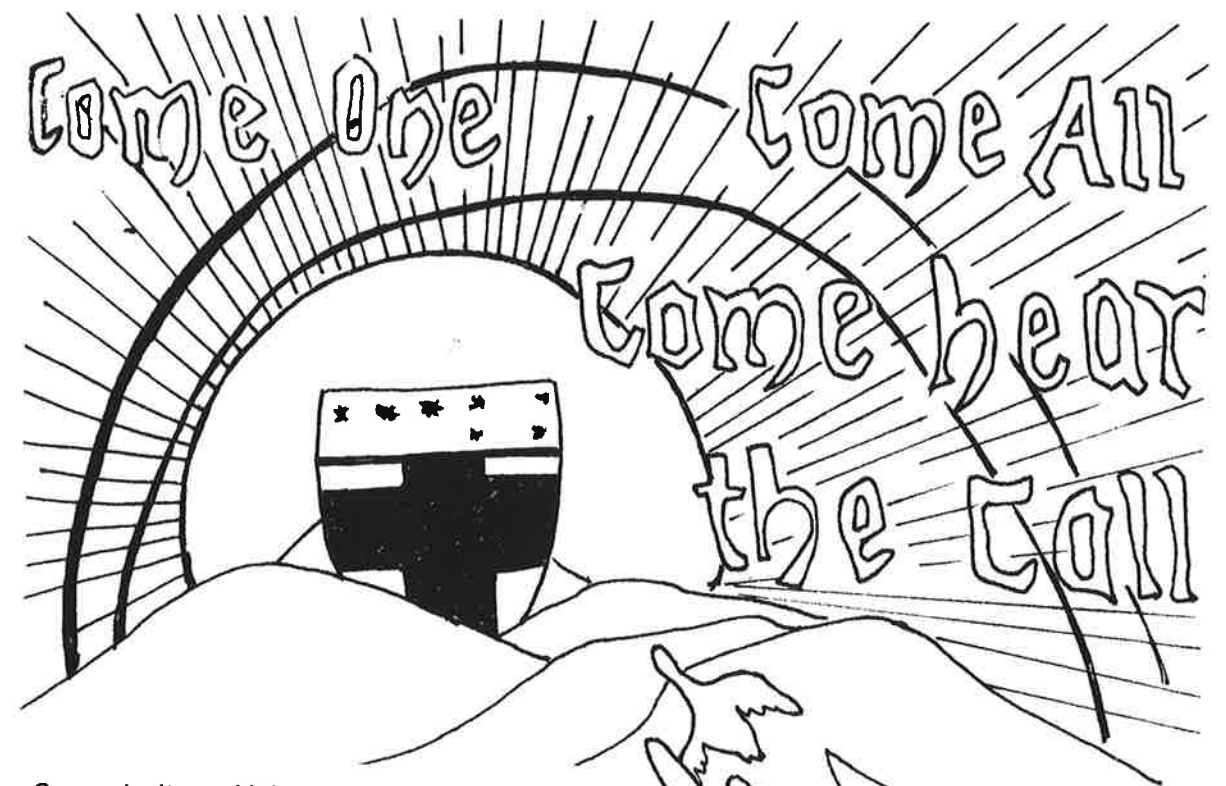

you can hear the beat of their wings whistling through the air in unison. . . .

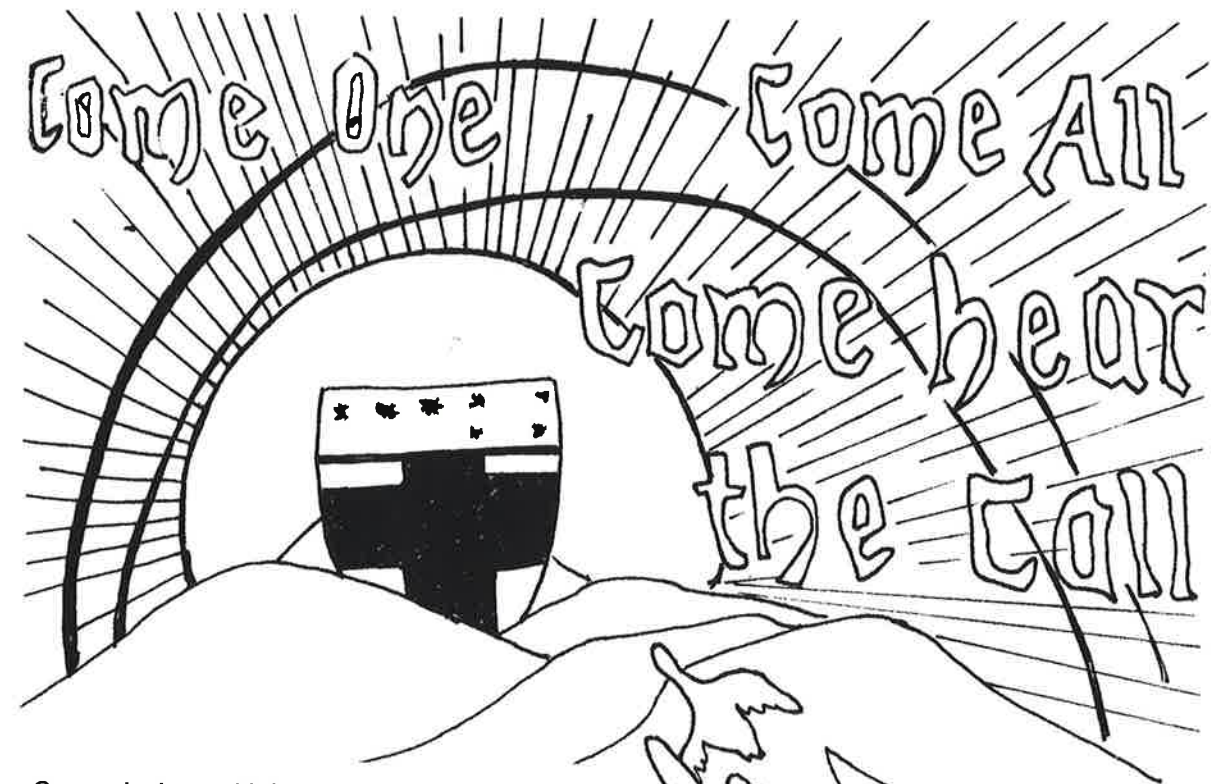
And that's the secret of their strength. . . .

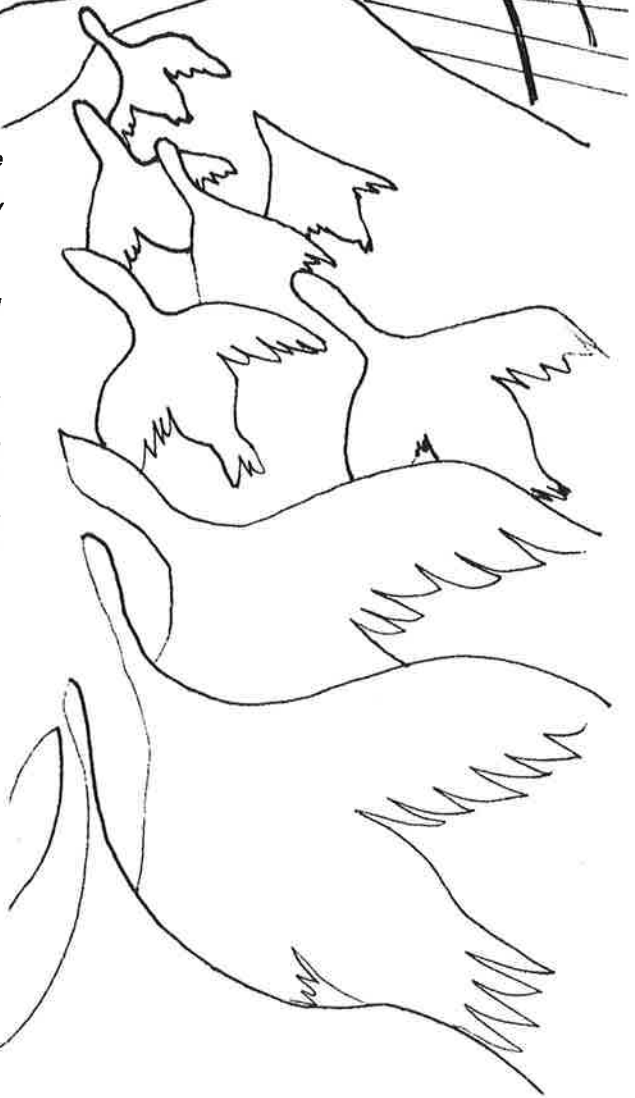
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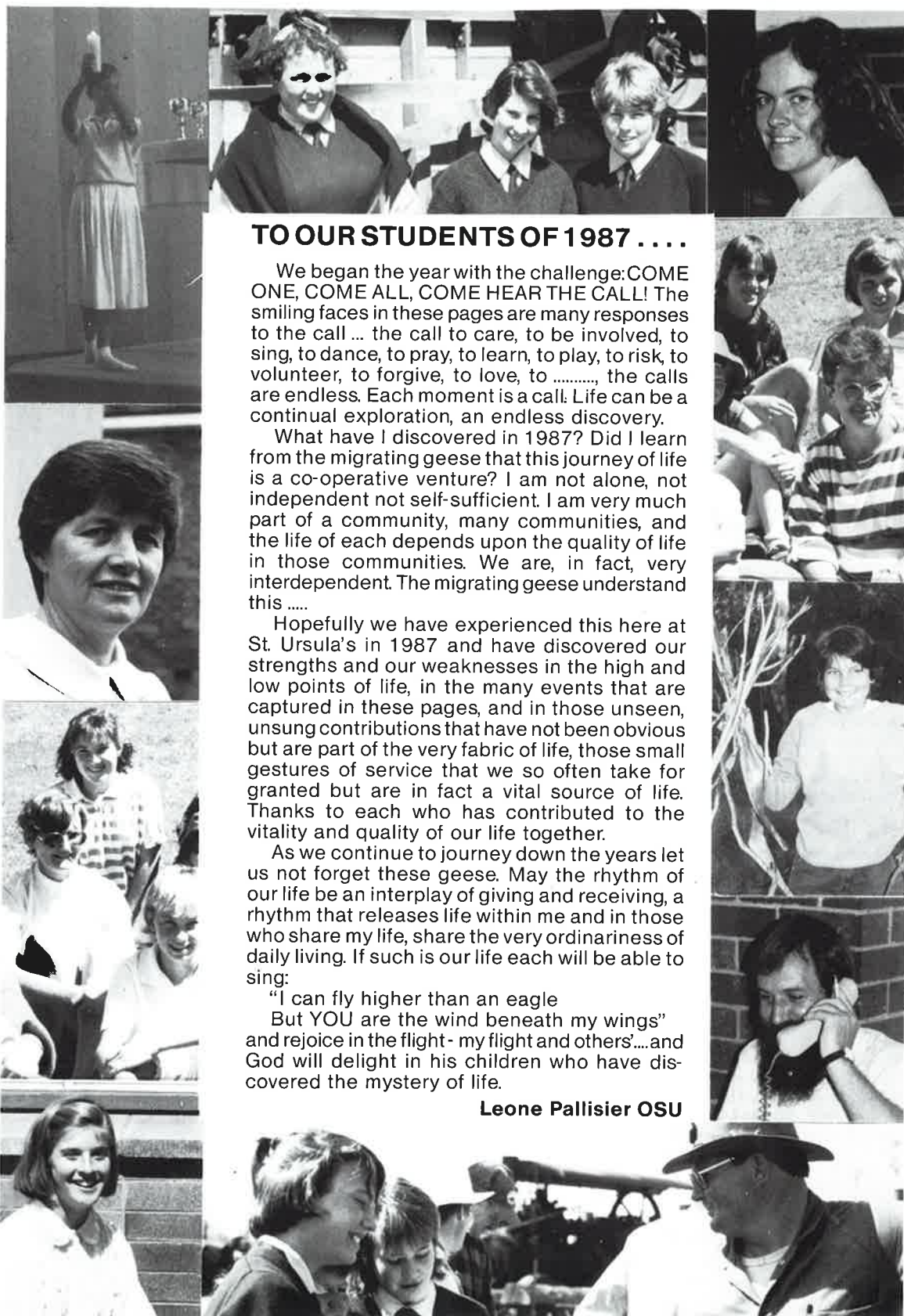

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"Reach out and touch someone's heart" — this was our aim for 1987. With the generous help and support of many of the teachers, especially Sister Leone, Mrs Ford and Mrs Pfeiffer and the enthusiasm of the Service Committee and the school, I feel we certainly fulfilled this task.

We had a good start in Term One by managing to "Reach Out" to our neighbours on an international level. There is a small hospital pre-school in the City of Lae in Papua New Guinea which was in desperate need of activities for the children. We sent over a donation of three cartons of used toys, books and old colouring-in books.

In Term Two we attempted to give something of more value than material objects — time and friendship. Pastoral Care Groups were given the chance to visit and spend time with handicapped children in special schools and the elderly people in Nursing Homes. Girls who did make these visits gained in return something of value, and awareness of the needs of certain

people in our community. These visits did continue for part of Term Three.

In Term Three we again attempted to "Reach Out" to the needy. Together as a school we donated \$89.00 and a collection of blankets to the St. Vincent De Paul Blanket Appeal.

At this point of writing, we have not yet completed Term Four. However, enthusiastic plans are underway. Each class will 'adopt a needy family'. Throughout the term they will endeavour to 'build up' a Christmas hamper especially for their adopted family. We will give the hampers to St. Vincent De Paul Society who distribute them to the families.

I would like to thank the teachers and my friends who supported me during the activities of the year and of course everyone who gave so generously. I thoroughly enjoyed being Service Co-Ordinator of 1987 and I hope that our service to others, in big and small ways will continue.

They picked up their lanterns and headed for the rocks where they could best simulate a light house. They gathered together to form an orb of light.

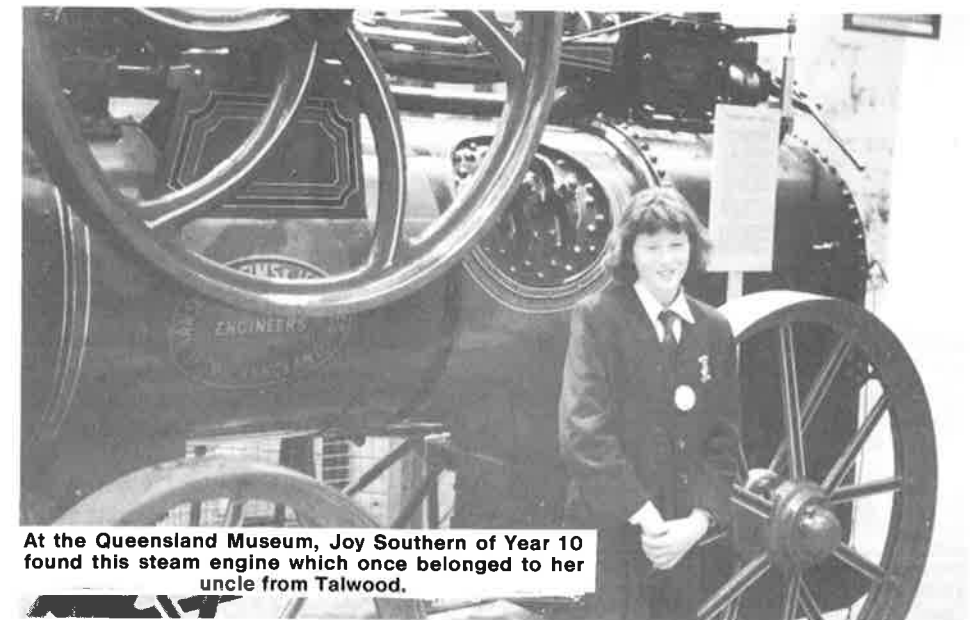

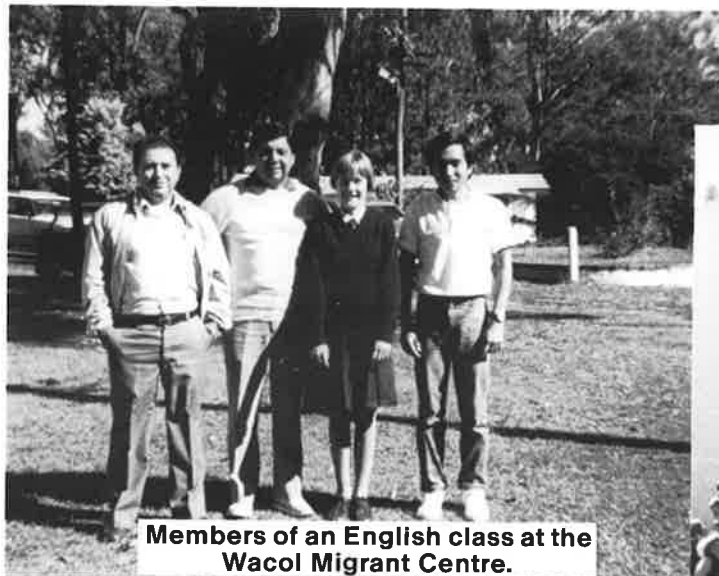

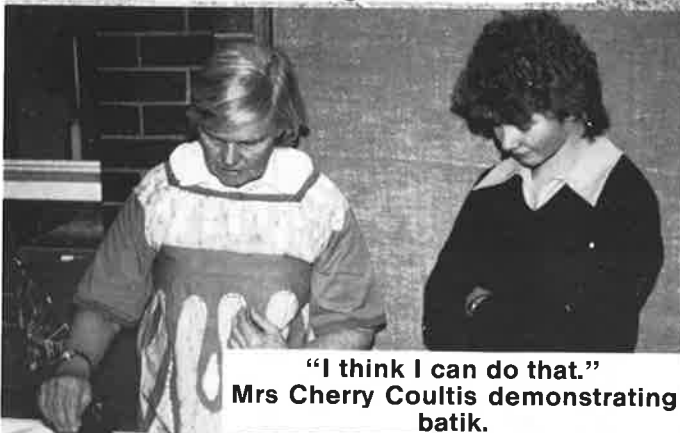

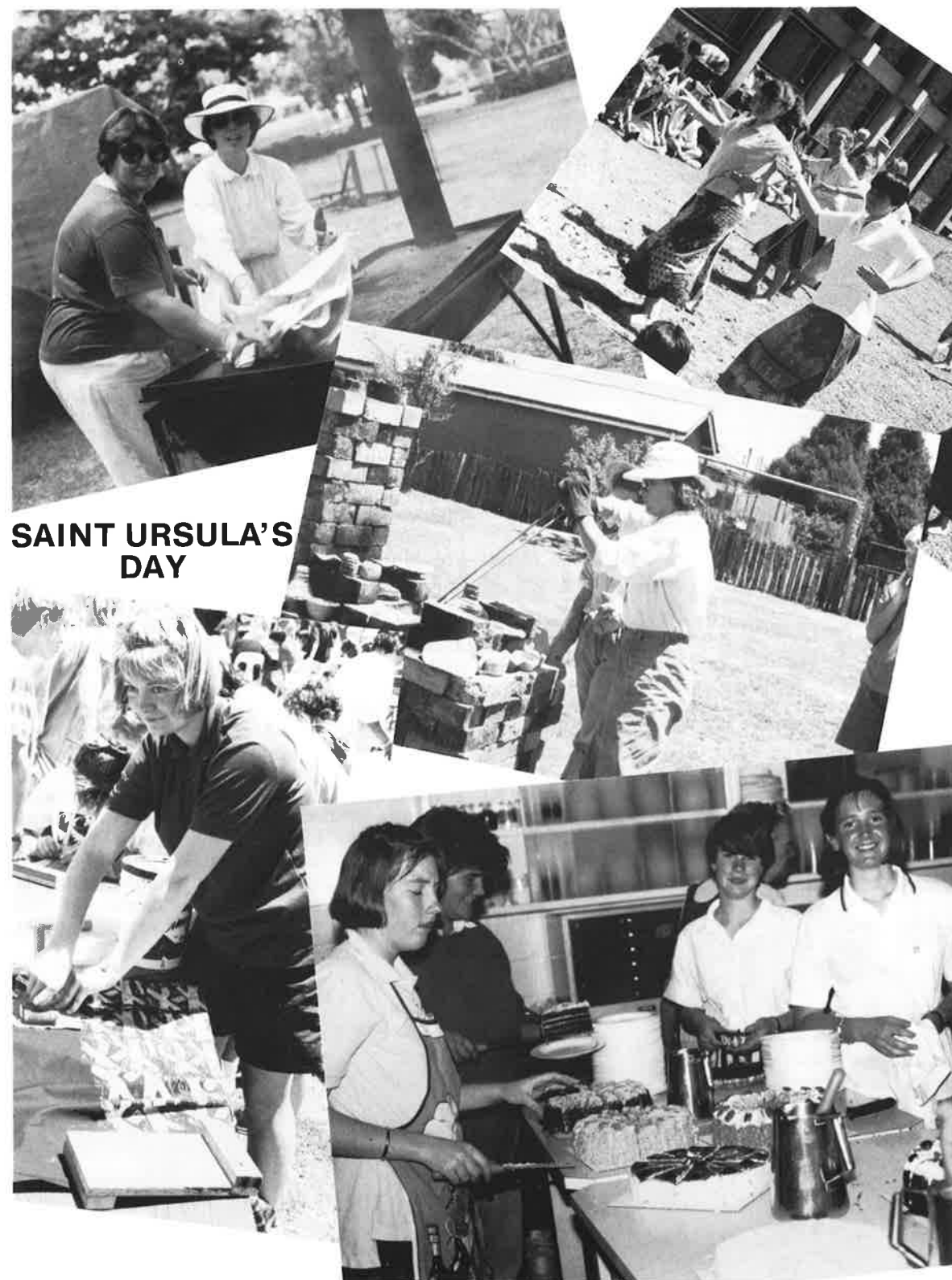
The best features of the trip were the friendship, the co-operation, the willingness to perform chores and the generally good behaviour of all who went.

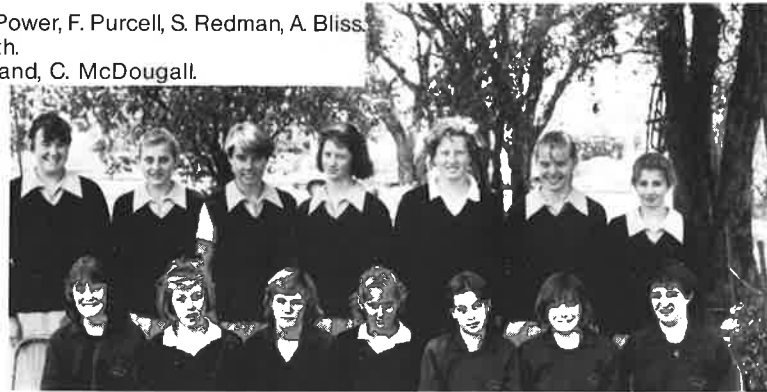
