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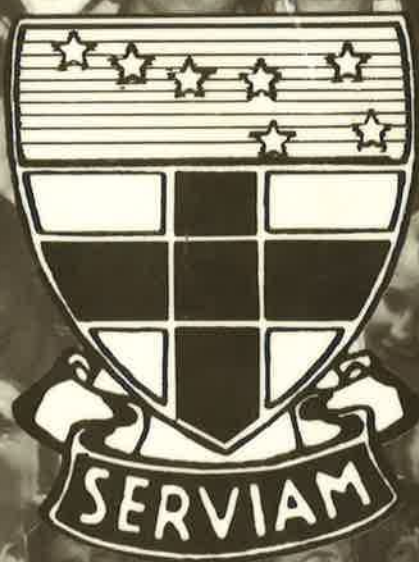

COME TOGETHER 1989

This year, Year 10 challenged us to **COME TOGETHER - DANCE**. This was a call to **community** and to **action**. Did WE respond to this invitation? Did YOU respond? Did I respond? Did we come together — to get to know each other, to work together, to share the good times and the not so good times, to support and even to correct each other? That is part of being a community — to take responsibility for each other, to really care about what is happening in each other's lives, to desire the best for the other. If you have really cared and made an effort you have opened yourself to life and growth — you have gained wisdom.

Our logo called us to walk and to chance to the rhythm of our motto, **SERVIAM — I WILL SERVE**. The BRIDGE invited us to reach across the many barriers that separate us as individuals, as groups and as nations. ... My time away from you this year brought me into contact with people from other countries that are so poor that a large proportion of the population is deprived of the very basic necessities of life — food, clothing, shelter. These people who are poor are not responsible for their poverty. Forces much stronger than themselves have created this unbelievable situation — economic structures, unfair distribution of land, the greed of the wealthy, corruption in government, foreign policy, exploitation of workers by business and industry. ... As a community we have made a tiny effort to reach across the miles to a small group of children in Peru to provide them with a little food. Not only must we reach out in compassion, but we must try

to study and understand why such situations exist and continue to exist and even become worse, in a world that technically has the capacity to feed, cloth, shelter, educate and provide medical care for all. ... What is it that enables us to allow thousands of children to die each day? I keep thinking of that slogan **LIVE SIMPLY SO THAT OTHERS MAY SIMPLY LIVE**. We need to keep asking ourselves how can we help to create a more just world?

Perhaps it all begins with **sharing**. Our meagre resources when shared can work miracles. Remember the little boy who gave his five loaves and two fish to Jesus? From his generous sharing a large group was fed. If our faith and trust in God are strong we too can work miracles. What loaves and fish do I have to share? My time when someone needs a hand, my understanding when another student is in difficulty, my companionship when someone is lonely, the truth in dishonest situations, a hug when there are no words. ...

In sharing we glimpse part of the mystery of life ... that I am capable of giving and receiving life in the very ordinary moments and events of each day. I gradually realise that there is more lasting joy in helping someone to understand a difficult maths problem, in coming to terms with a broken friendship, in sharing the wisdom and the wonder of an elderly person, than in acquiring the latest designer clothes, than in being seen to be popular.

May you never be ashamed of your resources, however meagre you think they are. Look at what Jesus did with the five loaves and two fish! If we are really grateful for the gifts we have and share them with others we will be amazed at how much life they will bring and how our gifts will multiply. We will be more confident, aware, outgoing. If we are more conscious of what we haven't got we will become possessive of our little, resentful and jealous. So acknowledge the beautiful gift you are and celebrate it — and don't forget the community needs YOU!

One of my favourite authors, Antoine de Saint-Exupery, in his book **Wind, sand and stars** has this to say about life: 'We forget that there is no hope of joy except in human relations. If I summon up those memories that have left with me an enduring savour, if I draw up the balance sheet of the hours in my life that have truly counted, surely I find only those that no wealth could have procured. True riches cannot be bought. ... Happiness! It is useless to seek it elsewhere than in this warmth of human relations. Our sordid interests imprison us within their walls. Only a comrade can grasp us by the hand and haul us free. ... And these human relations must be created. One must go through an apprenticeship to learn. ...

As you move into the last decade of the twentieth century may you continue to grow in understanding and appreciation of yourself, your family, the people of the world and the earth itself. And remember it is **PEOPLE** and not things that **give life meaning and hope**.

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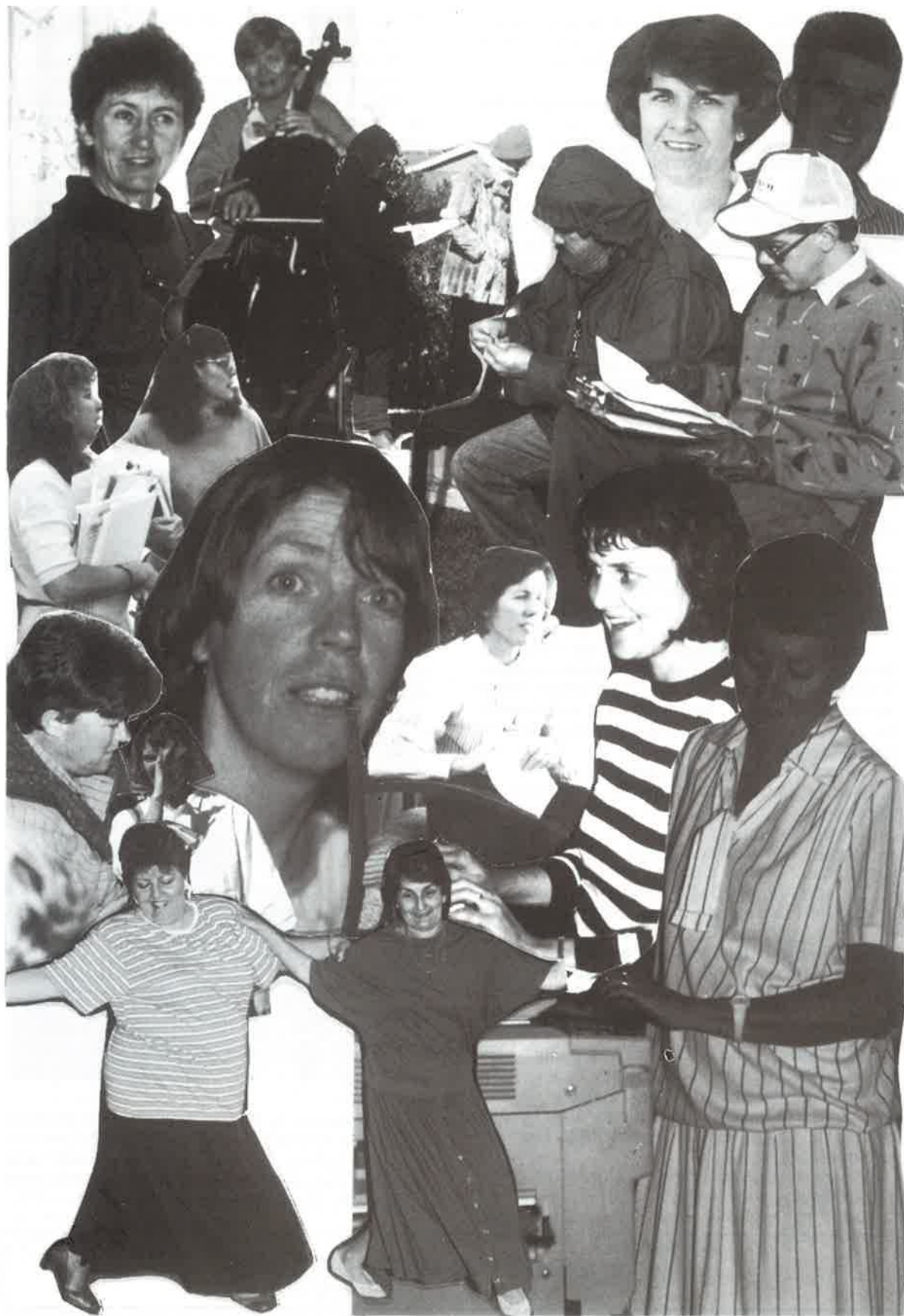
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SPEECH AND DRAMA

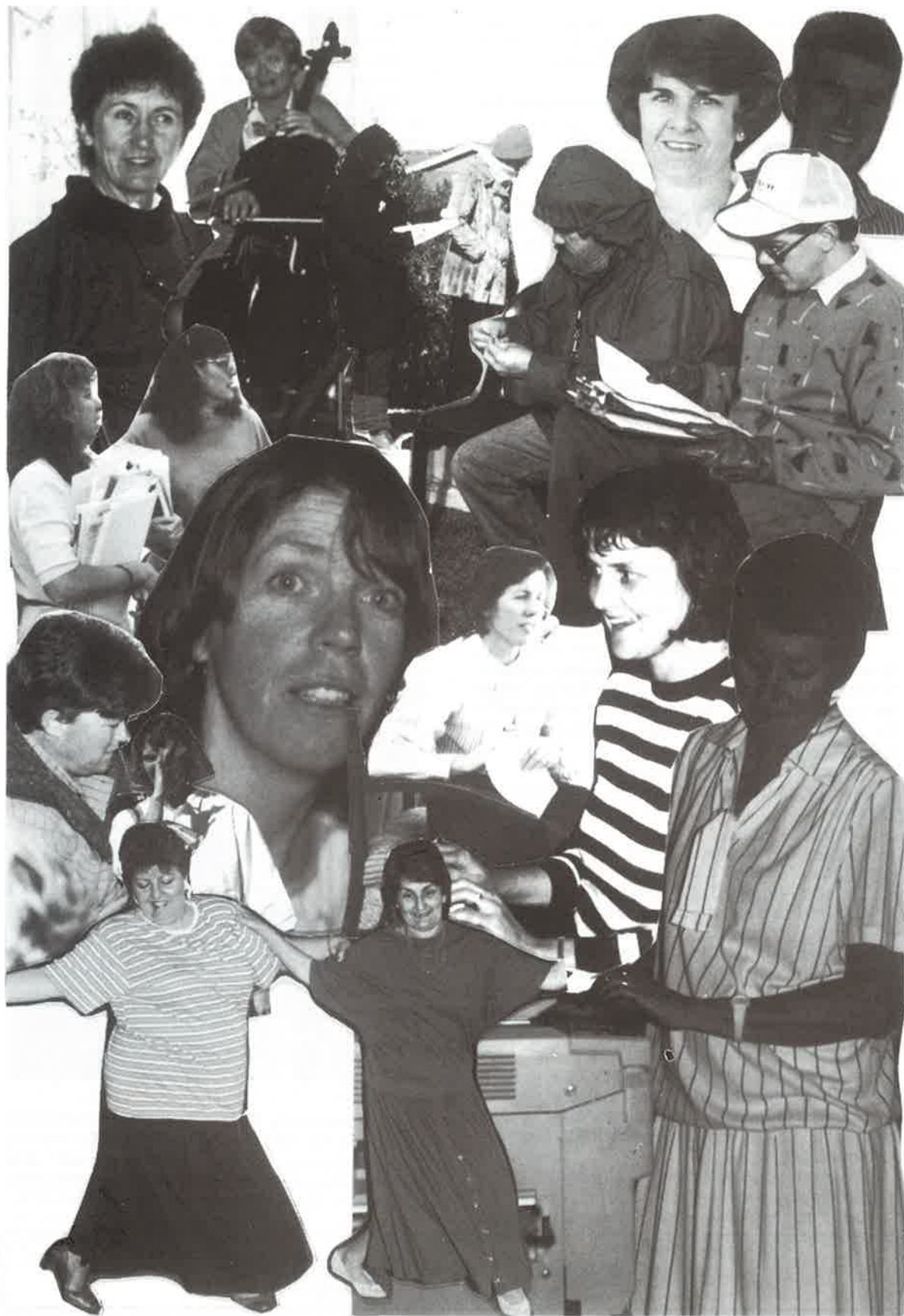

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On October 20th we celebrated the Baptism and Confirmation of Debby Metcalfe and the Confirmation of eighteen other members of our school community.

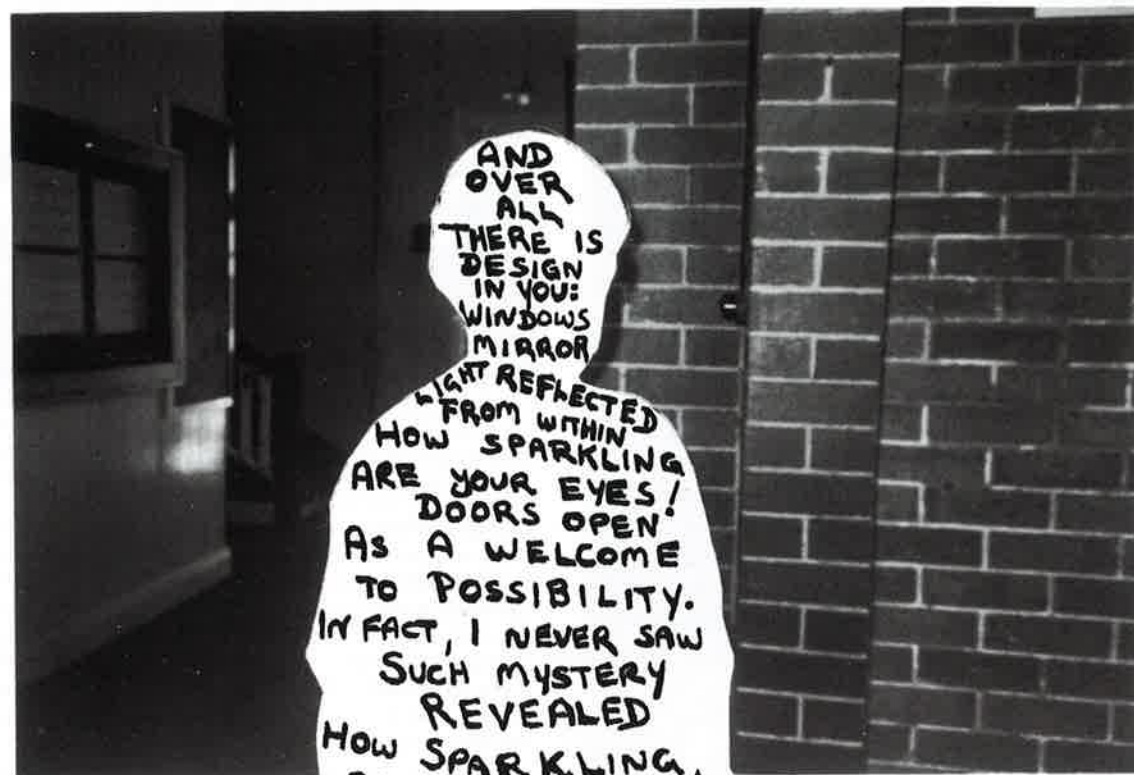

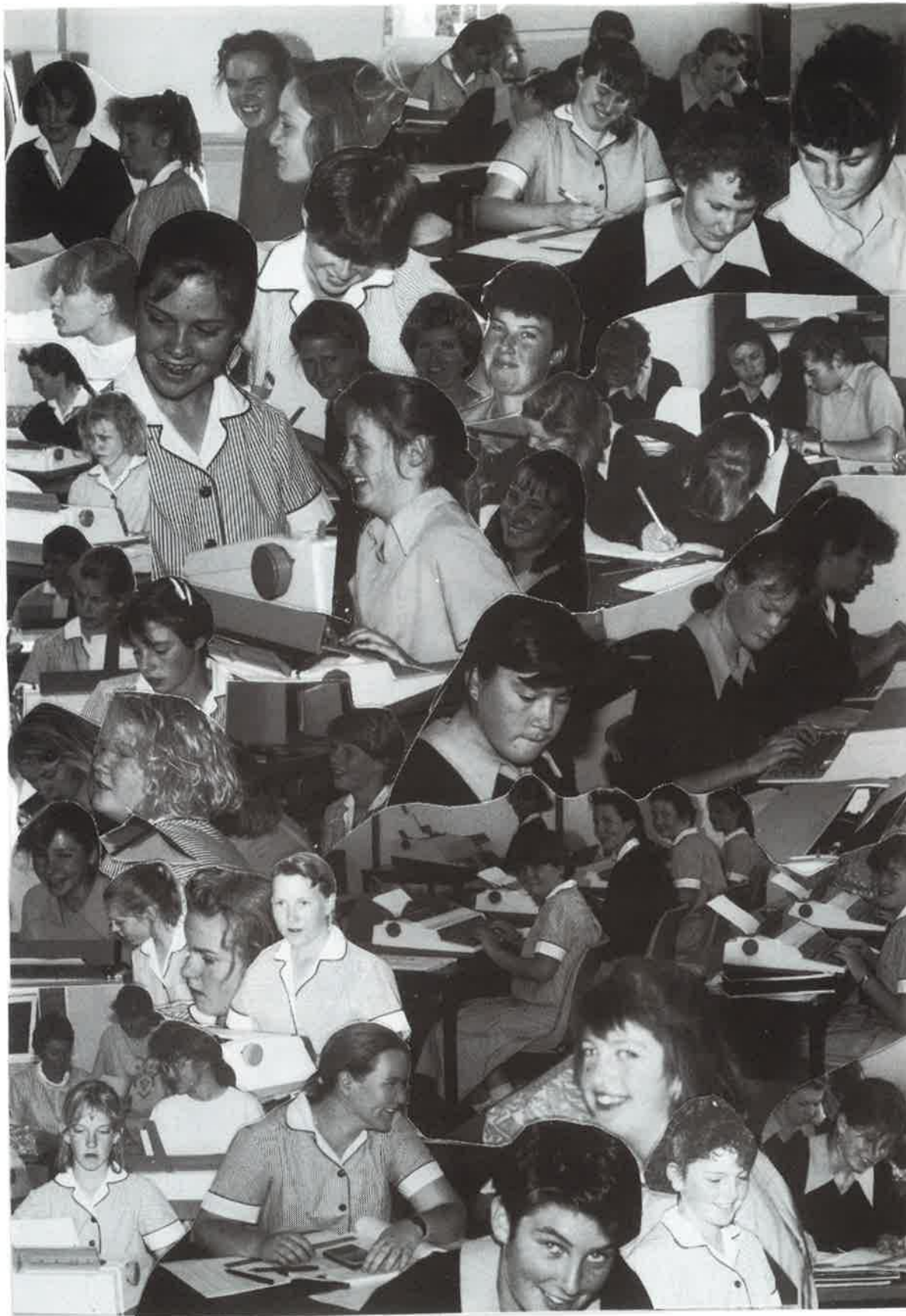

THE COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

1989 saw many innovations and progressive changes in the Commerce area.

RELOCATION:

The Commerce Department moved into the twenty-first century with a new centralised teaching area. The department gained a new, well designed computer room plus an attractive new typing room and these rooms then accessed two spacious business studies rooms. The new areas have provided more pleasant working conditions, and have been much appreciated by both students and staff. This has been evidenced by the number of students and staff wishing to use these rooms during lunch and study periods.

NEW EQUIPMENT:

With the newly located commerce area, new equipment had to be purchased to facilitate the new areas and to assist in the implementation of new courses. Computers were used extensively in typewriting — word processing, in shorthand — the typing back of transcripts, in business principles — the use of business records management through the use of a commercial software package and in options — in the management of software. St Ursula's is one of a few schools who can boast about a room full of electronic typewriters — with no student having to use a manual machine. The computer room is equipped with fifteen Oscar computers (one 20 mb hard drive and one floppy drive per machine) — IBM compatible, Star printers plus properly designed furniture to accommodate the new equipment. With an increasing number of subject areas wishing to use computers in the classroom, the computer room has become a very popular teaching area.

NEW SOFT FURNISHINGS:

The whole commerce area has been colour coordinated with the colourful typewriter covers which have replaced the old navy covers and the matching curtains which drape the windows of the typing room all blending to create an area conducive to effective learning.

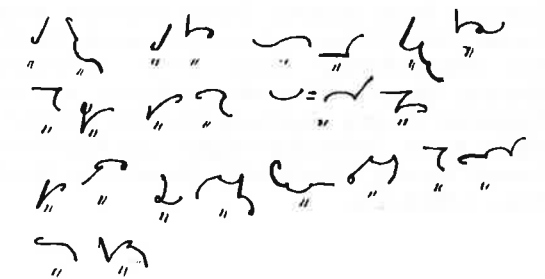
TYPING COMPETITION:

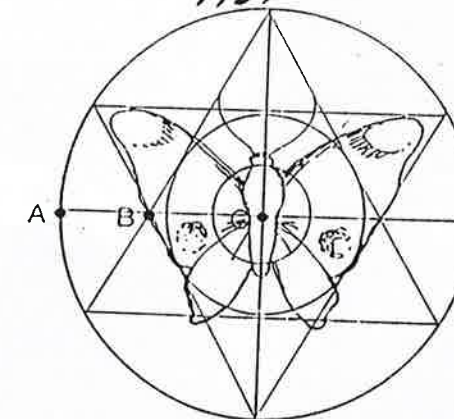

A piano pupil of Sister Margaret Short and now studying music at Queensland Conservatory, Majella gained the highest mark for Grade 8 piano in Australia (Trinity Board). Congratulations Majella.

1989 has been yet another 'musical' year at St. Ursulas and particularly one of 'musical growth'. The instrumental tuition programme commenced the year with 130 students and 10 music staff. This program has allowed the girls the opportunity of acquiring skills in a wide variety of instruments, and on the occasions that I have heard them perform I have been impressed with the progress that has been made in such a short time. Many of the girls who after only eighteen months tuition are already preparing for Grade 3 examinations.

Semester 1 saw the formation of the extra curricular music groups, such as Year 8 Choir, Year 9/10 choir, Band, Recorder Consort and Senior String Ensemble. New activities were also introduced, Miss Burstow initiated a Flute Choir, Mr Ionn a Guitar Ensemble, Sr. Margaret a Junior Strong Ensemble and Year 8 formed a Bush Band.

Throughout Term 2 a series of Lunch Hour Concerts were held as well as an Evening Concert for parents and friends. Programmes included a cross section of the activities of the department ranging from solo items, group items and class music groups. It is always good to see that the concerts are so well attended by the school community for not only are such occasions important in that they give the students opportunity for performance but is also good for the students to see that their work is supported.

Their commitment and hard work certainly paid off as the final performances were of an excellent standard. 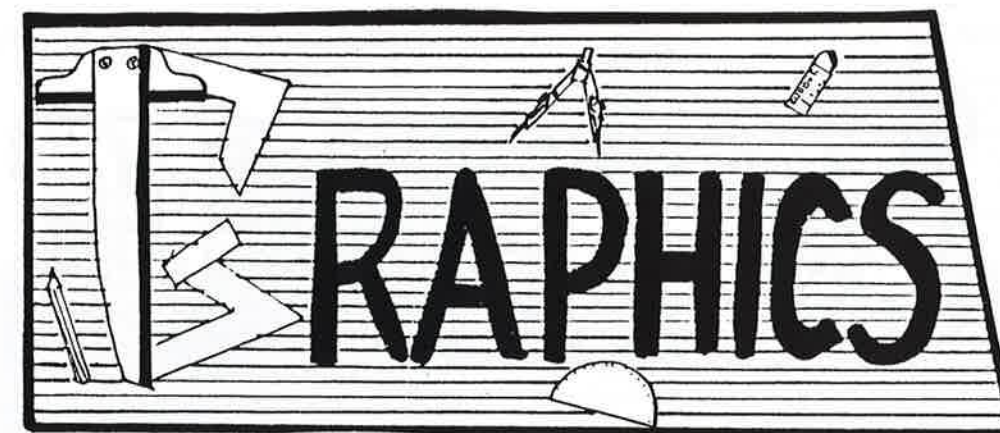

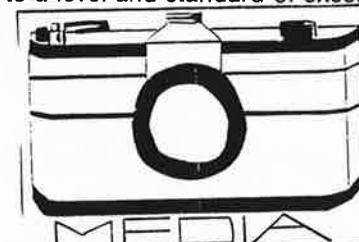


KEYBOARD LAB

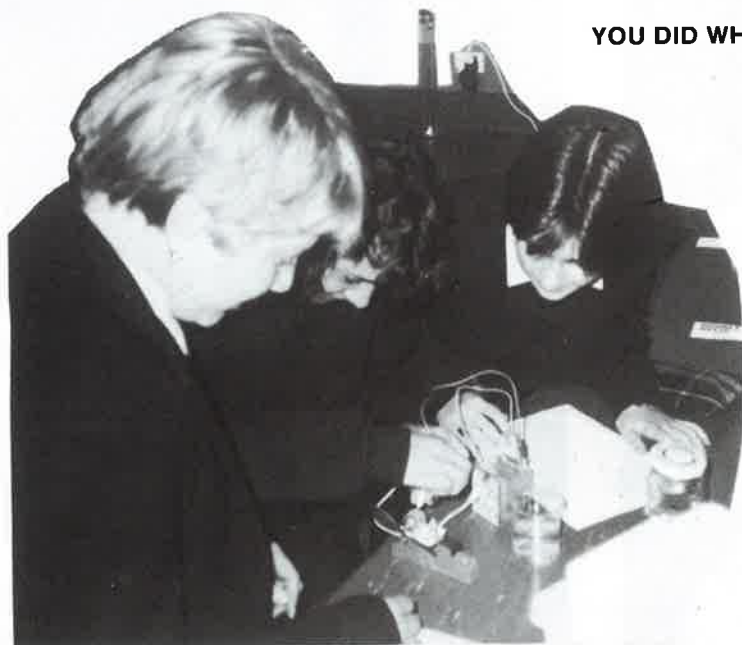

When Yotoku had to return to Japan it was a sad affair all round. She had had a very enjoyable time in Australia and promised to return someday.

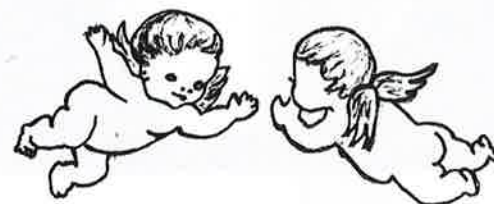
