All the ducks on the farm are transformed for an instant into migrant birds, and into those hard little heads, till now filled with humble images of pools and worms and barnyards, there swims a sense of continental expanse, of the breadth of seas and the salt taste of the ocean wind. The duck totters to right and left in its wire enclosure, gripped by a sudden passion to perform the impossible and a sudden love whose object is a mystery . . .

The barnyard duck had no notion that his little head was big enough to contain oceans, continents, skies; but of a sudden here he was beating his wings, despising corn, despising worms, battling to become a wild duck . . .

But domestic security has succeeded in crushing out the part in us that is capable of heading the call. We scarcely quiver; we beat our wings once or twice and fall back into our barnyard.'

My challenge to each one of you is to be wild ducks, wild geese. Be leaders in the community, encourage the barnyard ducks to fly, to see new horizons, to develop dormant potential . . .

Do you remember the theme for our Eucharist to celebrate the opening of the 1990 School Year? It was the parable of the sower and the seed . . . What fruit has the seed within you born during 1990? Did you nurture the 'holy ground' which is yourself? Did you allow God to work through your hands - to reach within to develop yourself, to reach out to others to touch and to share. Or were there thorns, rocks and scorching sun? Whatever your response remember that tomorrow is always a new day with another opportunity to fly and to rise above the pettiness that so often imprisons us within ourselves.

As time moves along let each one of us continue to nurture and cultivate our 'holy ground' - God's unique gift of my life. To develop this potential is one way to express appreciation for the special gift of myself . . . I believe we begin to live life meaningfully when we recognise life as a gift and begin to say thank you and to live in a spirit of gratitude.

As you journey on may you be outstanding in the quality of your living - your fidelity in loving, your passion for truth and the hopefulness of your spirit . . . May your life make a difference.

KATH ROSE

It's not surprising these days to find an Indonesian or German poetry book in Kath Rose's hand when visiting her out at Lourdes Home—for it reveals the continuation of her interest in cultures that she still finds particularly stimulating and enjoyable.

Until early 1989, Kath Rose was a familiar figure along the corridors at St. Ursula's College, or working in the Library with an individual student who needed help in a problem area. Then a fall hospitalized her for some months until she became a resident out at Lourdes Home.

Kath and her late husband Alec, retired to Toowoomba in 1970 from the responsibilities of managing a property in Tambo district, but unit life in the city was difficult for a country man and for a short while, Alec returned to the Longreach area to stay with friends. Kath took up a temporary position at St. Ursula's for six weeks teaching languages and

history and then moved to Our Lady of Lourdes to teach Grade One. She returned to St. Ursula's and for many years specialised in remedial teaching where she successfully achieved the desire to bring out the best in every child believing self respect was vital to progress. There were situations where students simply needed to do better at a particular subject and working one-to-one often helped those achieve this.

Every afternoon at 2.35, Kath returned to her unit where she taught her "special" students from 3 to 5.30p.m. with some help from Alec in the areas of science, and some of her pupils also came on Saturday mornings.

At an age when few would consider further personal studies, Kath commenced a four year external course in Asian Studies for her Institute Diploma, graduating at the age of eighty. During these years she went to bed at eight and was up by four every morning to study.

Born in New Zealand, 85 years ago, Kath was living in Sydney, when, at 15 she commenced a two year course in Primary teaching. By the time she commenced her studies for an Arts degree, she was teaching at a High School, and later she met and married Alec and moved to a station 25 miles outside Longreach. Their two adopted sons were taught by Kath through correspondence. In 1960 the family moved to Tambo to manage another property, and the drought conditions of the early 60's forced them to consider early retirement. Alec's indifferent health plagued him in recent years and he passed away in 1987.

Despite her silver hair and frail appearance, there is still a determination in Kath's alert eyes and a precise tongue behind her frequent smile - both attributes which her students would agree she successfully used in her teaching career to give them confidence in themselves and to fulfil the dream of her life - "getting kids to WANT to read!"

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LIBRARY

In this, the International Year of Literacy, it is appropriate that much activity has been centred around our library. Yes, we are a very different place this year with new staff, new circulation system, many new and additional resources, wonderful renovations, and new library hours.

This year I joined the staff of St. Ursula's as did my three aide - Ann Galligan, Megan Elkins and Jacki Yoxall. This is certainly a pleasant change for me after previously working for seven years in the library of a co-education high school, with a population of approximately 1000. Ann is a St. Ursula's/Downlands mum (Narelle and Phillipa go to school here and John attends Downlands). Anne looks after the library Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings until 6.00 pm. Megan and Jacki are University students who assist with book covering, shelving, etc. for half a day each and every week.

We are also most ably assisted by an experienced band of library monitors - Helen, Kate, Kerrien, Kylie, Libby, Madonna, Michelle, Narelle and Rachel. These girls are rostered to man the circulation desk during lunch breaks and help with book covering, shelving, etc.

A special thanks to Alan Ford (library/computer consultant) who has been an invaluable help this year, especially "behind the scenes". Many would not know that Alan spent many, many hours during the Christmas holidays with a group of helpers preparing our library for the new school year. In addition to culling old stock, retrieving many wonderful resources from teacher's secret hordes and subject storerooms, and giving each book in the library new spine labels, Alan and his helpers also barcoded every one of our books in readiness for our new computerised circulation system. He then added all the particulars (name, etc.) of our borrowers to the computer file and devised an appropriate loan system for us. So that students could easily access our much expanded book collection, Alan also added many more subject headings to our books and then produced computer generated catalogues. Not bad for six weeks work!

At the end of second term Clarry, Les and Ray commenced renovating our library. These renovations were completed during the term break, giving us a much more open, airy place for study and research. We are now able to store the Religious Education collection (books and audiovisual materials) which we acquired from "upstairs", the more than 250 new fiction titles we purchased with the \$2000 given to us by the P & F, and our new periodical collection. We now subscribe to 37 individual magazines of which nine are new subscriptions this year. The P & F have given us a further \$4000 dollars with which we hope to extend our literature section, and the committee has promised us even more money in the near future. So our extensions were much needed.

Our new Reference area houses newspapers, dictionaries, encyclopaedias and periodicals and the renovations have included a Prep room for staff and student use. This room contains our extensive video collections (more than 1681 separate titles), AV equipment (slide projectors, etc.) and teacher reference books. We also have taken a leaf out of the Social Science Room's book and attached Frontrunner to one of our walls for display purposes. This is a colourful focal point in our library. Our monitors and Jacki take much pride in their displays for each of the special theme weeks throughout the year.

This year we initiated a special service for all students (day girls and boarders) and extended our opening hours. The library is open for 48 hours each week. Monday to Thursday we open at 8.15 a.m. and close at 6.00 p.m.; Fridays we are open from 8.15 a.m. to 3.30 p.m.; and Alan opens the library for two hours on Saturday afternoons for boarders use.

With all the many changes in the library this year, I hope any subsequent year is not too dull in comparison!

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The weather was perfect. The nights crystal clear - the sky like Mrs Timbs pin cushion!

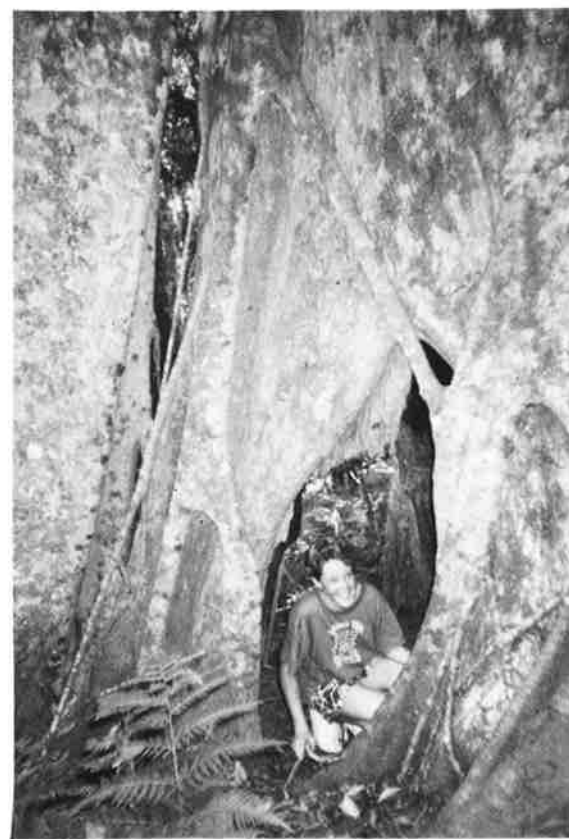
On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights of the grade eight camp most of the students had an experience of a bush camp.

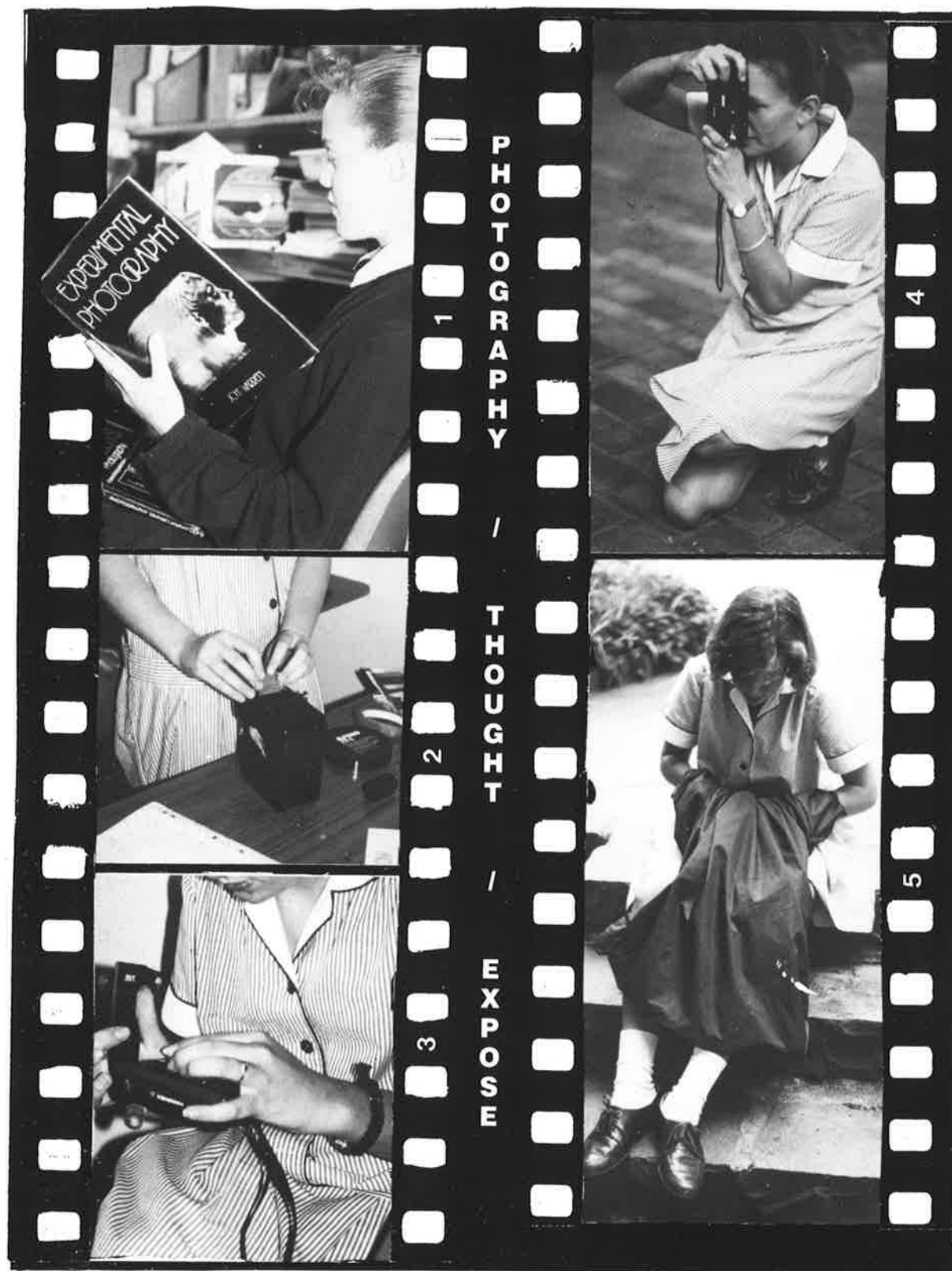
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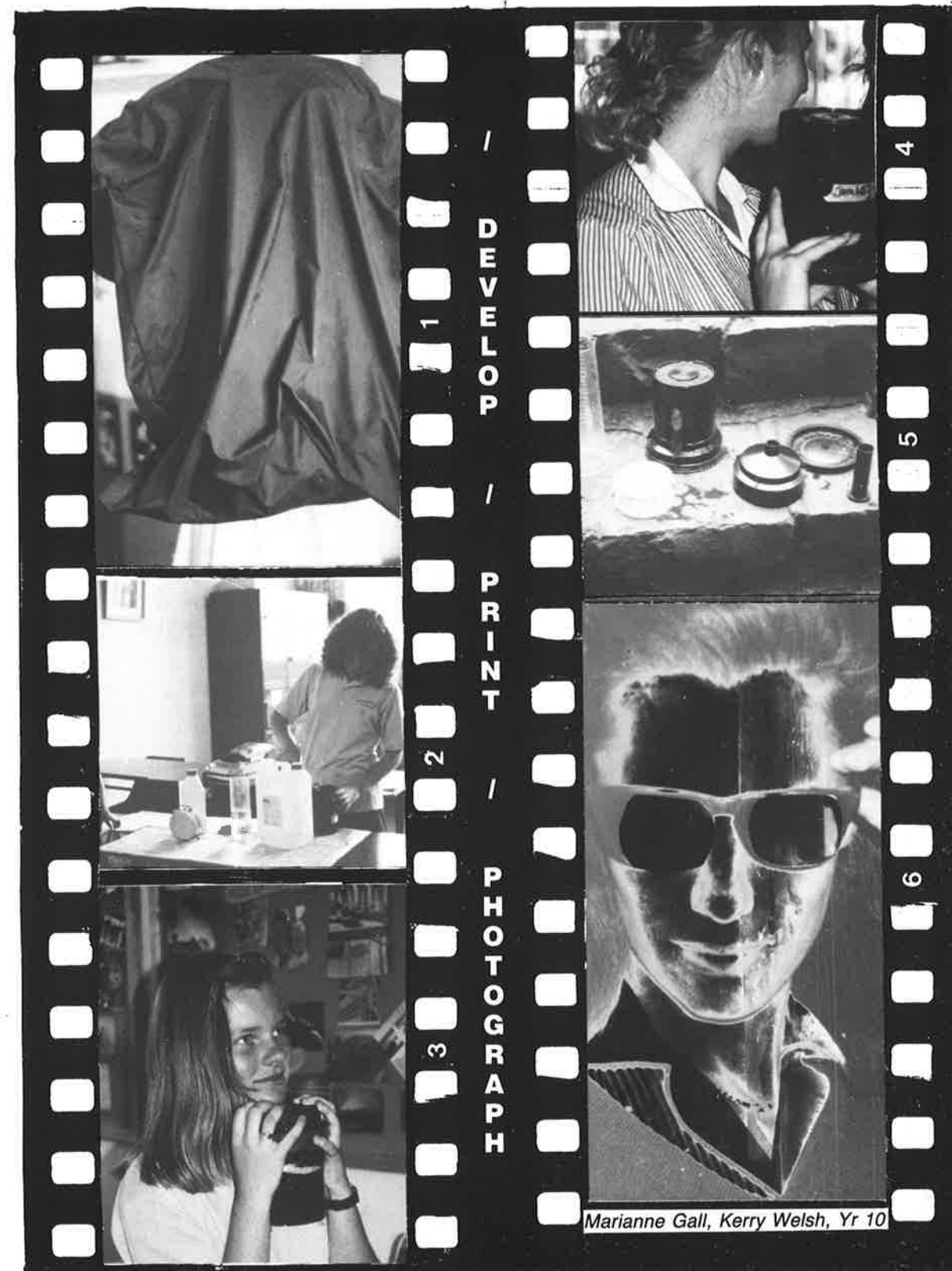

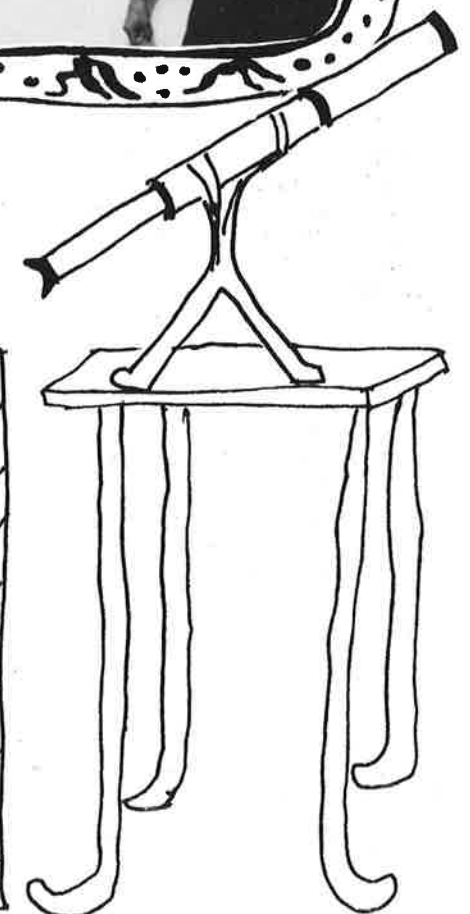

SKILLSHARE VISIT

On the 8th of August 1990, the Social Science Careers students visited Skillshare, on the corner of Wylie and Telford Streets. It is a government funded organization which is set up to help those people who are disadvantaged in the work situation. These are people such as migrants, long term unemployed, disabled and widows. These people have had to be registered with the CES and had to be unemployed for six of the last nine months.

There are two types of courses structured and open access. Structured courses are those which provide job training so that at the end of the course people are more experienced at a certain profession. Some of the structured courses include office procedure, nurseryhands, nannies, welding and tyre fitting. These courses run for approximately 5 weeks and members attend the classes everyday from 9am till 4pm.

Open Access courses are developed to help the unemployed make creative use of their leisure time. It helps their self-esteem by showing them they are skilled and do have talents. It also gives them a chance to meet other unemployed people. Some of the Open Access courses offered are pottery, leatherwork, woodwork, airbrushing and sewing.

This organisation is government funded and to continue being funded this way they must have a success rate over 50% or the government will cut the funds for that particular branch.

I believe that Skillshare is an asset to the people doing the courses. They have helped many people obtain jobs and in some courses have had a 100% success rate. They need a lot of support from the community with time, machinery and money and so far they have received it but they are very under funded and therefore need more support.

As we see the new Brescia rapidly taking shape, the past students among us find ourselves thinking back to the late 50s' and the 60's. Life in a boarding home has certainly changed since then.

Year 9 was a memorable year - we lived in Brescia with Mother Kevin in charge of us - Mother Kevin who was almost blind but with uncanny knowledge of all we did - whether it was checking who did not "wash-to-the-want" each morning in our aluminium dishes beside our bed, or who had not polished her shoes every night (we used to do that on the verandah, now the present Rainbow Alley.) Dormitories were for sleeping in, not for relaxing (unless illegally) - beds were in rows down each side, (no little "rooms"), quilts were starched white cloth, to be folded a particular way before going to bed; and each bed had a folding screen for privacy while dressing.

What we wore was an easy decision as we wore uniform or sports dress seven days a week - uniform being a maroon, tunic (fully pleated), a long-sleeved beige blouse with a tie, plus stockings with brown gloves and a hat to be worn outside the school grounds. To keep it clean, we wore a "coverall" over our uniform so, even if we weren't "square" in shape we looked it anyway. I don't remember how we survived in 30° heat but the nuñs' habits would have been worse.

No problems with lost expensive clothing or stolen money - we didn't have money as there was no place to spend it - no tuckshops, no shops we were allowed to visit. Our only source of succulent sweets or other delicacies was day-girls who might bring some to school or parents who sent food parcels. One girl from New Guinea used to receive a wonder parcel from Finneys in Brisbane every fortnight! How she was envied! Melbourne Cup time was interesting - we'd save up our fruit (which was available at breakfast and tea - a piece each) and use that for our Sweeps! Wonderful to win 20 pieces of fruit!

Entertainment was dancing in the Recreation Room (the present staff-room) after tea before study, and a film twice a month, on Sunday afternoon. Doris Day

or Rock Hudson often it starred and once we watched "A Town Like Alice" with no sound - still better than no movie 'we thought!'

School socials were rather rare - we'd go over to Downlands but I do remember a social one morning at St. Ursula's in year 10 when the De La Salle footballers were up - and we wore our school uniforms - nicely pressed under our mattresses the night before as we certainly did not have access to an iron.

In some ways we were spoilt - no chores to do - Sisters and "help" did all the providing and cleaning, with all the kitchen and convent area strictly out of bounds. Bread was always at least one day old and the system operated thus - a plate of buttered bread on each table and once that was finished, the 'head' of the table would order the required number of slices at the servery but, occasionally, the old bread would run out and we'd be served "fresh" bread. One can imagine what happened! Tea suddenly became a lengthy meal with everyone longing for bread.
