



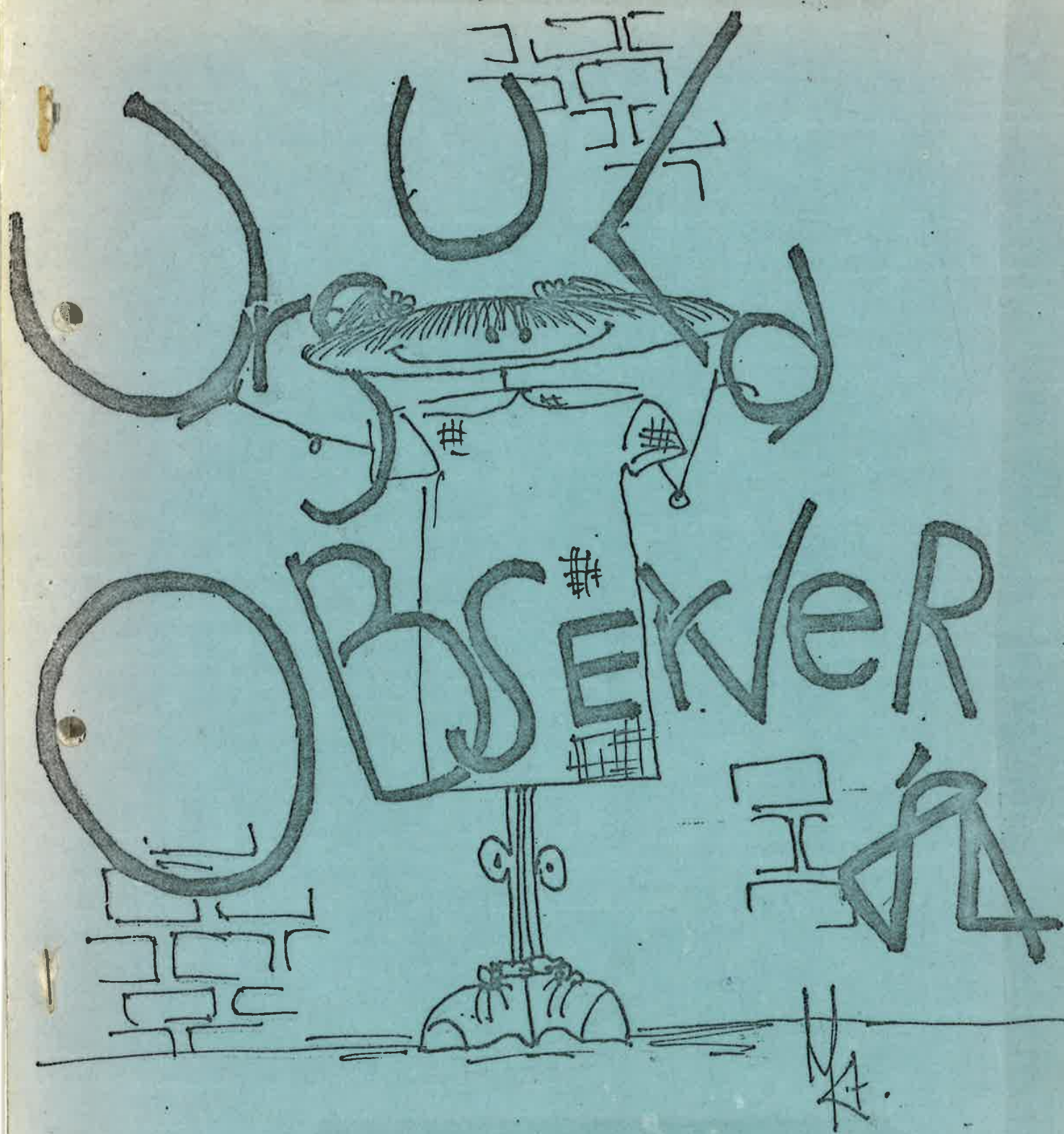

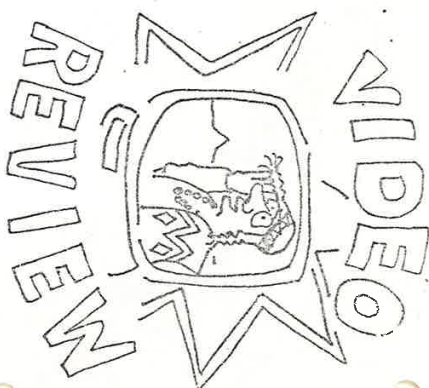

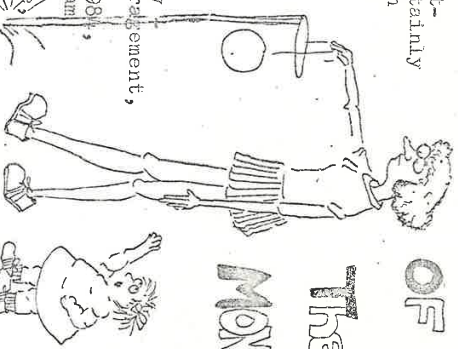

Everyone contributed and the general response was, thankfully, enthusiastic.

Here are just a few of the Year 10 comments:

Good to mix with other kids of varying ages, personalities and religions.  
I felt sorry for the guys!! before actually mixing with them, a lot of us thought they would be a big bunch of 'religious' no-hopers. But once we started to get to know them, we found that they are just a group of great kids. All in all the experience was rewarding and those responsible for the organization should be congratulated.  
If nothing else, just learning and hearing some new ideas as well as mingling with new people was worthwhile.  
Wouldn't it be great (fantastic, even) if all the Year 10's from St. Ursula's were as energetic as the girls from the Christian Outreach Centre were at singing.  
NOT AT ALL BORING!!

I hope they can come again or even another school; it makes R.E. a much more enjoyable and fruitful lesson.  
Some people reckon that they didn't get to meet anyone new, I think that maybe those people JUST DIDN'T BOTHER - per usual. I met over 25 people, and about 10 of those more personally. Our main aim at this meeting was unity between ourselves and other religions, which with effort may one day be achieved. I found that they were a much happier group when together than we are. Maybe it's up to us to learn something from this? year 10, you should be ashamed of yourselves, the boys and girls from Christian Outreach have shown us how we should feel about religion - as something meaningful - not just as a hodge podge.

They appeared very, very close to Jesus.  
From the start we thought they were going to be like aliens, in fact they acted just like us socially, even if they do see God in a different light.  
Some male singers have excellent voices, don't they Mr F.?? I enjoyed meeting people of different backgrounds and found it interesting to talk with them.  
Fantastic. I think the more often different religious groups get together the better. So often we have hang ups about people of other denominations. But underneath those kids were just like us - even the guys!!

The prayer service in itself was great. After the initial embarrassment most people got stuck in and had a wonderful time.  
Great fun. I loved the singing, even some of the TEACHERS joined in, at least, Sr. Janet did.  
Very worthwhile. I think we should have similar meetings with kids of other religions because, in this time of war and separation, anything pro-unity is a step in the right direction.

- I'm not really into gospel music or Religious devotions, but it was certainly an experience!!
- most people from the Christian Outreach Centre mixed well, but more importantly expressed their views genuinely.
- interesting and better than the usual religion lessons and films.
- definitely a new experience for 'everyone'
- I learnt a great deal. The organization was casual, and the small things like lighting the candle and handing out the flames were symbolic of our unity as a christian race.
- the kids from the Outreach Centre gave the impression that they were deeply involved and had made a commitment they didn't regret. Should we be more like that?
- we swapped ideas and learned how to have up music - if nothing else.

So there are some. I apologize to anyone whose ideas have been omitted, but it is impossible to condense all year 10 thoughts and not miss some.

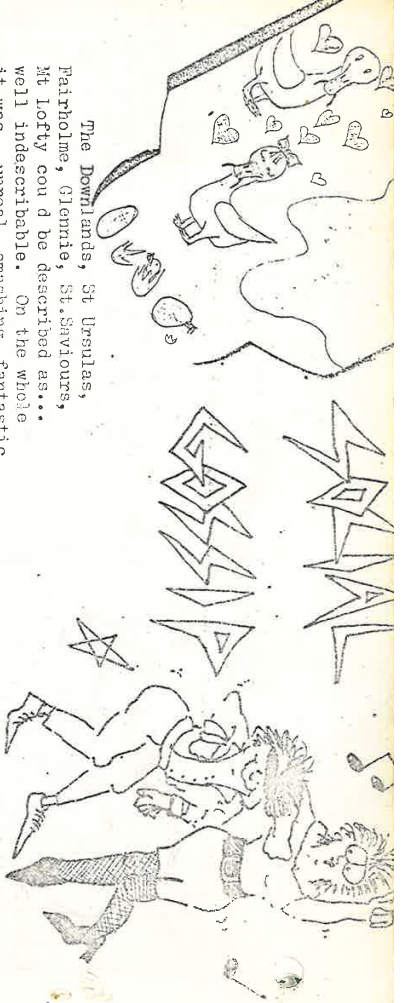
